

Chaffey College may certify a maximum of 39 semester units toward meeting this requirement; 9 additional semester units must be completed at the upper division level after transfer. Each course may only be used in one area of CSUGE certification. Courses in area A1, A2, A3 and B4 must be completed with a grade of “C” or better.

TRANSFER: A student must complete 60 or more transferable semester units with a minimum GPA of 2.0 or higher (2.4 for non-residents), be in good standing at the last college or university attended, and have completed or made up any missing college preparatory subject requirements. All CSU GE requirements in Area A, English Language Communication and Critical Thinking (at least 9 semester units) and Area B.4, Mathematics must be completed as part of the 30 units. Certain “impacted” programs have more applicants than space available and may have additional screening requirements. Please see a counselor, the Transfer Center and/or visit assist.org for more details.

CSU CERTIFICATION: GE Certification means that Chaffey College has verified that a student has completed lower-division general education requirements for the CSU system. Certification is important, without certification students will be held to the general education requirements specific to the CSU campus to which they transfer. This typically involves additional lower division work. GE Certification is not required for transfer. Some high-unit majors, for example engineering, may recommend prioritizing major preparation classes over GE certification. See a counselor for more information.
