Description

As Chaffey College continues to move towards more open campuses, the Wignall Museum presents an exhibition that reminds us all of the continued creativity of the Chaffey College community and that introduces students to the skills and abilities of our faculty and staff in the Arts, Communication, and Design (ACD) Academic and Career Community (ACC). Creating in a Time of Turmiol
An Evening of Poetry and Fiction
with Arthur Kayzakian, Laura Picklesimer, and Vicki Tulacro
Center for the Arts (CAA-211)
February 15 from 4-6pm (PST)

Join professors Arthur Kayzakian, Laura Picklesimer, and Victoria Barras Tulacro in a reading of their recent poetry and fiction written during the pandemic. Arthur Kayzakian will read from his collection, *The Book of Redacted Paintings*, selected for the inaugural Immigrant Writing Series with Black Lawrence Press; a book on how we hold loss after invasion, war, and migration—a sort of erasure ekphrasis. Laura Picklesimer will be reading from "Madeline," a speculative short story recently featured in the *Kenyon Review* and part of a larger multi-genre collection set in a near future of advanced A.I. and climate crisis. Vicki Tulacro shares a short story that collides fat-shaming and the political violence of the 2020 election and the lies we tell ourselves that ultimately solidify into realities. The reading will be followed by a Q&A and an interactive word game with the audience. Free and open to the public, but seating is limited. Doors open at 330pm.

Foraging is a skill for finding what you need, wherever you are. Focus on what will sustain, not satiate you. Use everything. Waste nothing. Get to know the intricacies of the land, like the intricacies of your body.

Using stories of edible plants and their uses to anchor each chapter, Forager: Field Notes for Surviving a Family Cult is both a searing coming-of-age story and a meditation on the ways in which understanding nature can lead to freedom, even joy. Join author and professor Michelle Dowd for a reading, and live music with light refreshments. Free and open to the public, but seating is limited. Doors open at 330pm.
